

## NICKERSON CHRISTMAS LETTER 2008

**CAT CARES, CAT-ASTROPHIES & OTHER CAT-EGORIES.** On a cold day in February a kitten appeared in our barn. We already had 3 cats so we found him a new home. In August we acquired another kitten. We found her a home too. 3 days later our big, fluffy cat met his fate by automobile. Nola had always wanted a Persian cat so she found one advertized in the paper. Her owner had died. ## **Machete Safety 101....BY RUSS**
